1. Economic Recovery and Growth

Given the current climate of federal and global fiscal restraint, what specific federal measures do you feel are needed for a sustained economic recovery and enhanced economic growth in Canada?

Less austerity, better regulated national and multinational banks, focus on and subsidies for "green jobs" and renewable clean-energy, encouragement for Canadian Small and Medium Enterprises to continue operations and grow.

2. Job Creation

As Canadian companies face pressures resulting from such factors as uncertainty about the U.S. economic recovery, a sovereign debt crisis in Europe, and competition from a number of developed and developing countries, what specific federal actions do you believe should be taken to promote job creation in Canada, including that which occurs as a result of enhanced internal and international trade?

Better regulations for multinational corporations, focus on and subsidies for "green jobs" and renewable clean-energy, encouragement for Canadian Small and Medium Enterprises to continue operations and grow. The Public Sector should attempt to pick up some of the Private Sector's slack.

3. Demographic Change

What specific federal measures do you think should be implemented to help the country address the consequences of, and challenges associated with, the aging of the Canadian population and of skills shortages?

Increase subsidies to public institutions for higher education, increase benefits for students who pledge to remain/work in Canada for a set number of years. Aid large, national and multinational enterprises in supplying senior, retiring employees with a minimum pension.

4. Productivity
