1. Economic Recovery and Growth

Given the current climate of federal and global fiscal restraint, what specific federal measures do you feel are needed for a sustained economic recovery and enhanced economic growth in Canada?

I payed 1600 for rent, 350 gas, 300 electric, 60 water, 150 internet, 100 cable/tv and what ever I had left went to food... it took me 2 years to save enough to finally start a company and get out of the poverty cycle, but when you let your people get ripped off constantly how can you ever expect us to prosper?
