November 1994	 95% of Canadians want the label to say if the food was genetically engineered. 43% of Canadians would be willing to pay more for non-GE foods. 	Optima

September 1999	 Between 1995 and 1999, the percentage of Canadians who believe that regulations concerning genetically modified organisms (GMOs) are inadequate rose from 31% to 41% (up 32%). 24% of Canadians strongly disagree with the following statement: "In the long term, GE foods are good for society"; 10% strongly agree. 80% of Canadians read food labels to learn about the products they buy. 50% want bans on the import of food containing GMOs. 81% of Canadians disagree with the statement that special labelling of GE foods is not necessary. In 2000, 79% of Canadians heard about or were very familiar with GMOs compared to 62% in 1998. The percentage of individuals who knew nothing about GMOs dropped from 39% to 21% (down 46%). January 2000	 Of Canadians familiar with GMO issues, 75% were concerned about the safety of GE foods. 94% think that Canada should be able to ban the import of GE foods if there are any doubts about their effects on health or the environment. 56% do not trust the government's ability to protect their health and safety with regard to GE foods. 95% want consumers to have the option to buy non-GE foods. 71% would be willing to pay more for them. Between July 1999 and August 2000, the percentage of individuals who had discussed biotechnology in the previous three months rose from 51% to 72% (up 41%). 95% of Canadians familiar with GE foods want them labelled as such.
