I am ready to receive motions for the chair.

Ms. Helena Jaczek (Markham—Stouffville, Lib.): I nominate Sherry Romanado.

The Clerk: It's been moved by Ms. Jaczek that Sherry Romanado be elected as chair of the committee.

Are there any further nominations? I see none.

Is it the pleasure of the committee to adopt the motion?

Some hon. members: Agreed.

The Clerk: All right. I declare the motion carried and Sherry Romanado duly elected chair of the committee.

I invite the chair.

I am now prepared to receive motions for the first vice-chair.

Mrs. Tracy Gray (Kelowna—Lake Country, CPC): I'd like to nominate the Honourable Michelle Rempel Garner.

The Clerk: It has been moved by Mrs. Gray that the Honourable Michelle Rempel Garner be elected as first vice-chair of the committee.

Are there any other motions? I see none.

Is it the pleasure of the committee to adopt the motion?

Some hon. members: Agreed.

The Clerk: I declare the motion carried and the Honourable Michelle Rempel Garner duly elected first vice-chair of the committee.

Pursuant to Standing Order 106(2), the second vice-chair must be a member of an opposition party other than the official opposition.

I am now prepared to receive motions for the second vice-chair.

Ms. Emmanuella Lambropoulos (Saint-Laurent, Lib.): I nominate Sébastien Lemire.

The Clerk: It has been moved by Ms. Lambropoulos that Sébastien Lemire be elected as second vice-chair of the committee.

Are there any other nominations? I see none.

Is it the pleasure of the committee to adopt the motion?

Some hon. members: Agreed.

The Clerk: I declare the motion carried and Sébastien Lemire duly elected second vice-chair of the committee.

Mr. Brian Masse (Windsor West, NDP): If the committee wants to, it can elect another vice-chair. I would suggest we do that, and have every political party have a vice-chair. I know PROC is dealing with this, but we can set our own thing here with regard to.... Each committee is doing its own separate thing. I think it would be in the best interest of all of us to just get that done and over with and let PROC decide what it wants.

This committee—and some have served with me on it—has a long history of being very solid in terms of its independent and non-partisan work in many respects. I originally served with Paul Crête here for many years, when we actually did have an extra vice-chair.

I offer that to the committee and hope that we can dispense with this and move on with our business from here forthwith. The Chair: Are there any comments?

Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner (Calgary Nose Hill, CPC): On a point of order, on advice from across the way, I understand that the committee has its rules and all of that sort of stuff, and I think we could proceed, Chair. I would just point out that this may be overruled, given that the Standing Orders right now only allow for that.

Out of respect for my colleagues, I'm happy to proceed. I would just caution the committee that, pending the decision from PROC.... It's the wild west; I'm not sure what's going to happen, so.... There we go.

Mr. Nathaniel Erskine-Smith (Beaches—East York, Lib.): If it's the case that the government has a standing order and PROC presumably will make recommendations to potentially change it.... I would like Brian to be a vice-chair, but I think a better course of action right now would be for us to go through the chair to request of PROC that they change the rules so that Brian can be a vicechair. I think that's all we can reasonably do today.

Mr. Brian Masse: I appreciate that sentiment.

My thinking is that if we did it right now and then PROC overturns us, it's done anyway and we don't have to revisit. If we do it now, either it works and we're here or PROC determines to overturn it, which is another story.

My hope is that we get it done. There are other committees that have the second vice-chair. You're going to have a mixed thing. We can have it done right now and not ever have to come back and move into a whole process of Standing Orders and so forth.

Mr. Nathaniel Erskine-Smith: I don't think anyone's going to run against you, though.

Voices: Oh, oh!

Mr. Brian Masse: That's not the point. The point is to get 'er done so that we can move on. That's what I'm hoping.

I don't think PROC is going to overrule us here. I mean, it sets a tone for the committee.

The Chair: As Madam Rempel Garner mentioned, this is unprecedented. We have a motion on the floor, but we also don't have the ability, really, to add a different position. I believe this is before PROC at the moment. I'm not sure if everyone is in agreement that we can wait and see what happens at PROC.

Ms. Rempel Garner.

Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner: Perhaps the most equitable course of action going forward....

Do we have a motion on the floor?

The Chair: We do.

Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner: Are you ruling it out of order or in order?

The Chair: I'm ruling it out of order. We can revisit it.

Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner: Chair, I would move, then, building on my colleague Mr. Erskine-Smith's point, that the committee request a ruling from PROC on this particular issue.

I will give notice that this is a matter that would be before this committee. I'm giving a notice of motion as well that we would address the issue of election of vice-chair in the future, should PROC rule in favour, so that my colleague has some level of comfort that the committee intends to address it should PROC rule favourably on the changes to the Standing Orders.

The Chair: Thank you, Ms. Rempel Garner. We will communicate with PROC on that specific request.

Madam Lambropoulos.

Ms. Emmanuella Lambropoulos: If it's okay with everybody, I would like us to go over some routine motions. I have copies in both official languages.

The Chair: First we have to dispense with the motion that we have.

Ms. Emmanuella Lambropoulos: Sorry.

The Chair: Can we have a show of hands on whether we are in agreement with communicating directly with PROC on this?

Some hon. members: Agreed.

The Chair: Thank you.

Ms. Emmanuella Lambropoulos: I have copies for everybody, if the clerk could....

The Chair: You've all received the routine motions from Madame Lambropoulos, so I'll let her begin.

Ms. Emmanuella Lambropoulos: With regard to the analysts, I move:

The Chair: Ms. Rempel Garner.

Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner: On a point of clarification, Chair, I'm wondering if my colleague opposite would like to move the entirety of the document in front of us, since it's in both official languages, so that we can adopt it just for expediency's sake.

Ms. Emmanuella Lambropoulos: Yes, that would be great.

The Chair: Do we have unanimous consent?

Some hon. members: Agreed.

The Chair: Perfect. It's adopted.

Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner: A point of order, Chair.

For clarification, because routine motions always come back to haunt us, I would suggest that my colleague formally move the entirety of this, that you open it up for debate and that we vote on the motion, so that, at some point in time, when I am a pain in the side of the government party, we have some clarity on what we adopted. I am taking a loophole away from myself, but I'm a stickler for procedure, Chair.

The Chair: Thank you.

Actually, my request for approval for unanimous consent was to table them all together. If that's okay, we'll table them all together. Now we can open the floor for debate on each of the remaining routine motions.

Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner: I have a question with regard to the addition of "Independent Members—Clause by Clause". The purpose of this, I'm assuming, is just to ensure that, with regard to any amendments on bills that would be traditionally looked at in front of our committee, independent members would bring their amendments to committee as opposed to the House. If that's the intent of the addition, then we would support that.

Mr. Nathaniel Erskine-Smith: I was not in Parliament before 2015, but I was told there were some extended proceedings—

Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner: Yes, there were.

Mr. Nathaniel Erskine-Smith: There were motions and amendments brought at report stage, so I think it's to address that and make sure they're dealt with properly at committee.

The Chair: Is there any other comment or debate on any of the routine motions before you?

Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner: I actually would like to amend the motion, or add a section under televising, that all meetings of the committee, other than those deemed to be in camera, be televised or, if that is not possible, be webcast.

The Chair: That is a new actual routine motion.

Can we go through these first, and then you can put forward a new motion if you like?

Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner: I'm just asking to amend my colleague's motion by adding another section saying that all meet-

ings of the committee, other than those deemed to be in camera, be televised or, if that is not possible, be webcast.

The Chair: Would you like to use that exact wording?

Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner: Yes.

The Chair: Is there any debate?

(Amendment agreed to [See Minutes of Proceedings])

The Chair: Since we've actually reviewed or gone through the debate on each of these motions, en masse, do you want us to vote on them en masse, or would you like to just vote on each of them individually?

Ms. Rempel Garner.

Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner: Since I've moved that this be included in that, I would like a vote on the amendment. Then, if there's no further debate, we would move to a vote on the entirety of the routine motions.

The Chair: We've already agreed to include them.

Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner: Sorry, I'm rusty; forgive me.

The Chair: For clarity, I'm going to review what we are voting on, all the routine motions. We've already voted on the analyst. The next one is the Subcommittee on Agenda and Procedure.

Of course, there is the amendment from Madam Rempel Garner with respect to televising all meetings when possible, and if not possible that they be webcast. Is that correct?

Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner: That's correct.

The Chair: Are we all in agreement?

The Chair: At this point, we've conducted the business at hand. Does anyone have a notice of motion, or anything they'd like to bring forward? Otherwise we can adjourn until the next meeting.

Mr. Masse.

Mr. Brian Masse: I have a motion that I'll circulate to members. I'll read it quickly, if I can, and I'll send it to your offices. It depends on how quickly we want to get things to do into the discussion:

That the House of Commons Standing Committee on Industry, Science and Technology hold immediate hearings with the Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Canada's telecommunications companies and other telecom experts and advocacy groups to better understand

a) the influx of fraud calls to Canadian home phones and cellular devices including robocalls, ghosts calls, and spam calls

b) to give an update on the success and failures of the national do not call list, and

c) to outline the September 2020 STIR/SHAKEN measures and how this will benefit Canadian consumers.

I'll send that to your offices to think about. This is related to all the spam you're getting on your phones and so forth. I've been working with the companies over the years and the Competition Bureau, whatever. I thought that maybe if we don't have something in front of us right away we could get some public attention on how to protect consumers. It's bad for our economy, and also for people's mental health, getting all these calls and different types of intimidation. We see our constituents with language barriers and seniors particularly targeted. I thought that a few hearings on it would bring some public attention. Even if we can't get some big solutions to it right now, we would at least bring some awareness to the issue to help Canadians.

That's the intent of the motion, even if we had just a few meetings. I'll circulate that to the offices and give it to the clerk as well.

The Chair: Thank you, Mr. Masse.

We'll take that as a notice of motion. Please provide it to the clerk, who will have it officially translated and circulated to the committee.

Mr. Brian Masse: I actually had it translated.

The Chair: Thank you.

Mr. Erskine-Smith.

Mr. Nathaniel Erskine-Smith: I'm just piggybacking on Brian's notice of motion. To make the time in the next meeting and the meeting after that more effective as we develop a work plan, can we make sure, when we are adjourning for the day, that there is a proper subcommittee meeting, and that we are getting a work plan in place as quickly as reasonably possible?

The Chair: Thank you, Mr. Erskine-Smith.

During the routine motions, we did vote on the creation of a subcommittee. Any issues with respect to potential upcoming studies could be sent to the subcommittee for consultation and then reported back to the full committee, if that is the wish of the committee.

I have Madam Rempel Garner.

Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner: I'm wondering, Chair—I'm not moving this—if my colleagues would like to move in camera after the remainder of the meeting so we could have a private conversation about upcoming business, not necessarily to move motions at this point, but just to discuss next steps in putting together a work plan. If I moved that, would it be okay with you guys?

Mr. Nathaniel Erskine-Smith: Yes.

Hon. Michelle Rempel Garner: Madam Chair, I move that we move the meeting in camera.

The Chair: Does everyone agree?

Some hon. members: Agreed.

The Chair: We'll just take a few moments because we need to do some technical things.
