## **Q1** - Information on transfer payments

The table below presents grants and contributions funding for each component of the Indigenous Languages and Cultures Program, as well as for engagement, the Office of the Commissioner of Indigenous Languages and agreements under sections 8 and 9 of the *Indigenous Languages Act*. It also presents the Indigenous Languages Branch's operational funding.

Grants and contributions are **transfer payments**, or payments made to an organization on the basis of an appropriation made by Parliament (under Vote 5). Transfer payments differ from funding for federal departments' operating expenditures, which is provided through appropriations made in Parliament under Vote 1.

There was no lapsed funding for the 2019-20 to 2021-22 period.

Information on recipients of grants and contributions and the funding amounts they receive is proactively disclosed on the <u>Open Government website</u>.

# Q2 – Target of 83% of participants improving their use of Indigenous languages

Canadian Heritage has recent data for the indicator: Percentage of participants in language-learning projects who report an improvement in their ability to use an Indigenous language in interpersonal communication.

For the 2018-19 funding year, 88% of participants in language-learning activities reported improved language proficiency as a result of their participation.

For the 2019-20 funding year, 82% of participants in language-learning activities reported improved language proficiency as a result of their participation.

For the 2020-21 funding year, 96% of participants in language-learning activities reported improved language proficiency as a result of their participation. This result meets the target of 83% set for March 31, 2021.

Of note, adjustments to results may occur based on data quality monitoring or new reporting from recipients and will be noted in future reporting cycles.

Data is not yet available for the 2021-22 funding year, as complete data has not yet been received by Canadian Heritage. Several recipients of the Indigenous Language Component received two-year funding for 2021-22 to 2022-23 and are not required to report their results back to the Department until the end of the second year. The program aims to report on 2021-22 data in the next public reporting cycle.

# Q3 – Consultations related to the nomination of the Commissioner

The 2020 consultations on the implementation of the *Indigenous Languages Act* (the Act) included a focus on the Office of the Commissioner of Indigenous Languages, including on the appointment of the Commissioner and Directors, per section 13 and subsection 16(2) of the Act.

Canadian Heritage, in collaboration with Indigenous Peoples, undertook 26 virtual consultation sessions, from September to December 2020, in which approximately 500 people participated, including 300 First Nations, Inuit and Métis Nation communities, from each region of the country. Canadian Heritage worked collaboratively with the Assembly of First Nations, Inuit Tapiriit Kanatami, the Métis National Council to identify who should be invited to the consultations, and also reached out to Indigenous organizations directly to ensure broad participation. Of note, an invitation was sent to all Indigenous governments. A list of participating organizations and experts is included as Annex A. You will note that invitations were sent to organizations over and above those who were able to participate.

After each consultation session, the Department posted a document online to capture what was said. These summaries can be found at the following link: <u>Consultation sessions dates and summaries of discussions - Canada.ca</u>.

The Commissioner and Directors of Indigenous Languages were appointed by the Governor in Council, based on the recommendation of the Minister of Canadian Heritage. A merit-based selection process was undertaken to identify highly qualified candidates.

A modified Selection Committee was established, which included First Nation, Inuit and Métis Nation representation so that Indigenous perspectives could directly inform the selection of the Commissioner and Directors. The Selection Committee assessed the candidates against established criteria that reflected what was heard throughout the consultation sessions on the Office of the Commissioner of Indigenous Languages. Members of the Selection Committee observed the highest standards of impartiality, integrity and confidentiality to ensure that the best candidates were selected for the four positions.
